

You Can Help to Keep Support for SOS



\$30,000 Grant to SOS to be Discontinued in 2020

City of Winnipeg's Water Services is proposing to eliminate a \$30,000 grant to Save Our Seine in 2020. In 2013, Councillor Mayes did something that was unprecedented by giving SOS money from his ward budget to hire an Executive Director. He then made a strong case to

include a grant to SOS in the city's annual operating budget.

While \$30,000 is only a tiny drop in a very large departmental bucket (\$132 million), it has been a godsend to Save Our Seine and to the Seine River Environment. It has given the organization enough financial stability and continuity to fulfill its core mandate – taking care of the Seine River. We have been able to work in partnership with the City of Winnipeg to carry out a number of activities along the Seine River.

The grant from the City is a **cost effective return on investment** is
making a real difference to the City of
Winnipeg and is a small amount out
of over a \$100 million dollar budget.
Through our partnership with the City,
we are able to carry out a great deal
of the needed clean up and
restoration work along this important
greenway through our summer
program and many volunteers.

What will the loss of this grant mean to SOS AND TO THE SEINE RIVER ENVIRONMENT?

- SOS will be unable to retain its part-time Executive Director.
- SOS will rely solely on volunteers to sustain the organization.
- Volunteers will have to focus almost entirely on applying for grants and fundraising to replace the missing revenue and complete current projects – rather than furthering SOS goals.
- SOS will have to cancel its summer program to keep the Seine River clean and navigable as it does not have enough volunteers to manage the grants and implement the program.
- SOS will lose six seasonal jobs

- (including the Seine River Clean-up Coordinator) and \$22,000 of annual provincial and federal funding.
- SOS is currently working with the city on a \$300,000 Seine River Greenspaces Enhancement Project to restore habitat, enhance trails, and connect people to nature. This will have to be completed entirely by volunteers in 2020.
- New projects (with potential provincial funding) will be dropped - including the Seine River Pollinator Habitat Enhancement Project.
- SOS will not have the organizational capacity to envision or take on exciting new projects that will benefit the city.
- SOS will be unable to attend many of the stakeholder meetings and public hearings for projects that impact the health of the river (past examples: Precinct K development plan, aqueduct bank stabilization, Fermor Bridge project, Highway 100 redesign, countless parcel developments along the river)
- SOS's 30th Anniversary in 2020 may mark the end of the organization unless the grant from the city is re-instated.

What will it mean for the Seine River Greenway?

- Fallen trees and broken branches from the October storm will create debris dams in the Seine River. These dams will block the flow of water and catch garbage. The river will return to being an unsightly mess rather than a paddler's paradise.
- Habitat restoration along the Greenway – including the Niakwa Trail Rain Garden – will suffer unless more volunteers can be recruited to eradicate weeds and plant native

- species.
- The installation of an accessible dock at John Bruce Park in will be in jeopardy unless fundraising targets can be met by volunteers alone. If targets are not met, the money raised to date will have to be returned to the funders (approximately \$60,000)
- There will be one less environmental group in Winnipeg with sufficient capacity to help fulfill the city's commitment to plant a million trees.
- The city will lose access to thousands of dollars that can be raised by SOS.
- The only dedicated and strong voice for the Seine River will be significantly weakened.
- Residents, business and organizations along the Seine River will face an uncared for river and greenway.

FOR EVERY \$1 THAT THE CITY GIVES SOS, WE HAVE RAISED AN EXTRA \$2.3 FROM NON-CITY SOURCES.

Since 2013, the City has provided SOS with \$208,000.

- This has allowed Save Our Seine to raise close to \$500,000 in project money that has been instrumental in making Winnipeg a better place to live.
- It has been used to
- clean the river,
- protect the Greenway from encroachment by developments,
- maintain and enhance city trails and parks along the Greenway,
- protect and enhance wildlife habitat
- improve recreational infrastructure,
- create a demonstration rain garden,

- plant trees,
- remove invasive species,
- protect trees from beavers,
- restore natural habitats,
- monitor river quality and quantity,
- educate school children, youth, university students and the public,
- celebrate heritage and art,
- create a wonderful natural greenspace as a legacy to our children and grandchildren.

Save Our Seine River Greenspace Enhancement Project

SOS has embarked on the Save Our Seine River Enhancement Project thanks to grants received from the Manitoba Provincial Government Manitoba Habitat Heritage Corporation: Conservation Trust Grant and the Winnipeg Foundation.

News from the Summer Urban River Keepers Program



2019 SOS Summer Urban River Keepers Program a Success!

Each summer, Save Our Seine employs a team of people to further its goals and initiatives. Historically, the main role of the SOS team was to make sure that the Seine River is clean and navigable, clearing debris dams and garbage from the river. This is work that would not be done by either the City or

the Province.

The SOS summer team provides a valuable service to the City or Winnipeg Parks Operations by assisting with the removal of garbage and litter from the river, public trails, and city park lands along the length of the urban Seine River (26-km) and assisting with trail maintenance and repair.

Note: The team consisted of all new members the summer of 2019, therefore **Chris Pearce (volunteer)** wonderfully helped the team out this year with a 2-week orientation, helping the team get to know the river and the duties for the summer. Which was very much appreciated.

Michele Kading, SOS Executive Director served as Project Manager.

Key Accomplishments

- Removal of invasive plant species
- The identification of the areas that contain buckthorn is essential for future management of the species, therefore the creation of a map locating these areas along the river was a key accomplishment.
- Roughly 40 log jams were cleared within the river

- throughout the summer, which created a channel for wildlife and canoeists, and also provides a healthier flow of the river water and gets rid of areas that easily collect garbage.
- River and on shore clean-ups where garbage was extracted for the habitat, an estimate of 90 garbage bags were filled throughout the summer, which provides a healthier environment for both humans and wildlife.
- Over 70 species of flora and fauna were identified along the river and were posted on iNaturalist, which documents the location and the species found.
- Communication with the public was also a key factor to a successful summer along the Seine, the team let citizens know what we were doing and why.
- Social media also played a major role in helping get information on the Seine and the work that is being done along the Seine out to the public.

SAVE OUR CANOPY CAMPAIGN

The City of Winnipeg's iconic tree canopy is in crisis. Join us in asking Mayor and Council to increase funding for our city's trees this budget season.

OURS-Winnipeg is launching the Save Our Canopy email campaign calling on Mayor and Council to increase the forestry budget by \$7.61 million, the shortfall identified by the Parks and Open Space Division in 2019.

Winnipeg's trees face huge threats including disease, climate change and chronic under-funding. A flourishing tree canopy makes our city a vibrant, world-class and healthy place people want to live, work and visit. But the city's forestry budget has not allowed for adequate disease management, planting or pruning. As a result, we are losing our canopy and we need urgent action on the part of our politicians.



PUBLIC INVITED TO VIEW SOUTH PERIMETER HIGHWAY DESIGN PLAN

Manitobans are invited to see the province's long-term vision for a safer South Perimeter Highway (PTH 100), Infrastructure Minister Ron Schuler announced today. The province is hosting three public information sessions in December to hear feedback on its preferred design for the roadway.

"Our government's first priority is the safety of Manitobans on our roads," said Schuler. "Thousands of vehicles

drive the South Perimeter every day and many access this portion of road through uncontrolled intersections. We need to do substantive work to address safety and operational problems."

In 2018, the province launched its South Perimeter Highway Design Study to guide a long-term vision to upgrade PTH 100 to a modern freeway standard with three lanes in each direction. A freeway standard eliminates at-grade or level crossings; intersecting roadways would use interchanges overpasses, while PTH 100 would go overtop railways.

The province began its public engagement process in 2018 to inform the study and present design options. The third and final phase of information sessions is scheduled for December, in which the proposed functional design of PTH 100 alignment and associated structures will be presented to the public for feedback.

Manitobans are encouraged to share their ideas and participate in public discussions to help shape the 2020-21 provincial budget, Finance Minister Scott Fielding announced today.

Public budget consultations will take place from late November 2019 to February 2020. Fielding announced the first three locations INCLUDING WINNIPEG:

Wednesday, Dec. 11 from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Golden Boy Dining Room, Legislative Building, 450 Broadway, Winnipeg.

This session will be bilingual and fully accessible. Accessibility requests can be made to budget2020@gov.mb.ca.

It will reach thousands of Manitobans through telephone town halls and the minister also plans to consult with frontline government workers as part of budget consultations.
