

Vermette Park Update

This summer, the focus of Save Our Seine's activities are largely aimed at the Vermette Park Grounds. Thanks to generous funding from Manitoba Hydro, Wal-Mart Evergreen and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Stewardship In Action Save Our Seine was able to develop a plan for the site which will involve the planting of several hundred large calliper trees mixed in with native shrubs.

The planting season has started on the Vermette site for the 2008 season but the Park is far from completion. Saturday June 21st, 18 volunteers came out to lend a hand and planted, watered and mulched 127 trees! The SOS Green Team also planted an additional 90 trees the following week but the work has only begun.

The open spaces will be used for annual picnics, cultural

celebrations, historical tours, and much, much more!

SOS hopes that Vermette Park will allow for the preservation and restoration of the historical Métis Pilon house.

Jane's Day walk through Bois des Esprits

He stuck around until we embarked, patiently posing for pictures. The second, and less invited guest, was snow. No need to check your calendar, this was indeed May 4th, but remember folks this is Winnipeg. Snow is fair game until July it seems, and even then there's an off chance of the white stuff. We were also joined by Kathleen Leathers of the Prairie Pathfinders, a regular at SOS walks, and Minister of Water Stewardship, Christine Melnick. In addition Andy Park from the University of Winnipeg and Centre for Forest Interdisciplinary Research joined us to continue his search and data logging of unique geographical centers in Bois Des Esprits.

With the wet fluffy flakes starting to blanket the trails, we departed on our journey through Bois Des Esprits. The annoyance of slippery walkways and drenched clothing aside, the snow did make for majestic scenery and contrast with the soon to be budding greenery. Denis DePape, board member of SOS, led us on an informative journey through Winnipeg's newest protected forest. Passing through the forest, we had a chance to experience each of the unique ecosystems in the forest; upland forest, river bottom forest, grasslands, and wetlands, and discover how each plays a pivotal role in the health of the forest and the environment as a whole.

As our journey passed the Royalwood Bridge, we learned of the battle fought with developers to protect this unique forest. Bois Des Esprits represented a dying element in Winnipeg; 117 hectares of untouched river habitat which was home to hundreds of species of plants, animals and insects. Taking a walk through the forest, it is easy to understand why this area was so important to the SOS members, and why they fought so hard to preserve it. Along the way we were regaled by the aforementioned Cooper's hawk, a family of nesting geese, returning wood ducks and mallards, as well as several deer. This was in addition to the many smaller characters chirping and fluttering in the trees above us, no doubt preparing their own spring nests.

Our walk also gave me time to reflect on the true purpose of this day, partaking in a "Jane's Walk". Jane Jacobs vision was to engage citizens and neighborhoods in civic planning, instill a sense of belonging in the citizens, and encourage a pedestrian friendly urban or suburban environment. It is easy to see how our walk through Bois Des Esprits fit Jane's vision; a gathering of local citizens, walking through a forest recently protected by citizen action to be enjoyed by all residents of Winnipeg. The forest demonstrates how involvement in civic planning and development by interest groups and ordinary citizens alike can dramatically change the landscape of a city.

As with every good walk through Bois Des Esprits, ours was capped with a visit to the impressive 12 foot tall tree spirit carving, Woody. Woody's home was a perfect place for the final photo opportunity before our emergence from the bush and back into the developed neighborhood. Etiquette Guide to the Bois des Esprits

The Bois des Esprits Protected Forest attracts hundreds of visitors every year. Young and old, individuals and groups alike come to the Forest to enjoy the tranquil serenity of a true urban oasis right within the city of Winnipeg. Who can blame them for wanting to get away from the hustle and bustle of everyday life and stroll through this truly exceptional 117 hectare 'ecological jewel', lush with deer, beavers, wood ducks, painted turtles and over 140 species of bird. Save Our Seine feels that the public should be aware of some etiquette tips for visitors to this unique urban forest in order to protect and preserve it for others to enjoy:

- ◆ Access to all public parks is <u>not permitted between the hours of 11pm and 7am</u>.
- ♦ If a disturbance is observed (vandalism, excessive noise, fires, etc.) you should <u>notify the authorities immediately by calling **986-6222**.</u>
- ♦ It is unlawful to plant any vegetation within a public park without permission from the City. Introducing non-native species such as spruce or pine trees can have devastating effects on the riparian ecosystem.
- ♦ All pets must be on a leash and owners must clean up after their pets.
- ♦ Please stay on the paths and leave only your footprints behind.
- ♦ Most importantly, enjoy your visit!

🕵 Canadian Rivers' Day 2008: Blame it on the rain 🖫

As the saying goes: April showers bring May flowers. The importance of Spring rains doesn't end there.

As you have most likely noticed, the unusually dry weather this early Spring allowed most to get out and enjoy the sunshine but it also created unseasonably low flow levels in Winnipeg's rivers, and the Seine is no exception.

According to Environment Canada, historically the average precipitation for Winnipeg for the month of April is near 36mm while this April we received only 9mm which is far too little precipitation to quench the Seine's thirst.

Like all rivers the Seine relies on the annual spring flush to raise its water levels, flush its banks, deposit nutrient-rich silt, and provide adequate water levels throughout the summer months which are generally drier.





Alf Warkentin, from the office of the Minister of Water Stewardship informed Save Our Seine that the decision had been made in early May to temporarily allow for increased water flows into the Seine at the St. Anne diversion. While the rain that we received in mid-May did increase these flows, it was thought to only be short-lived. Our crystal ball wasn't very accurate in foreseeing late spring rains.

So what does this all mean? Well, these low flows prompted some changes to the Annual Save Our Seine Canadian Rivers' Day celebration. The actual canoe paddle down the Seine was thought to not be possible and was therefore cancelled but Save Our Seine has planned the family-friendly planting event on July 26th at Vermette Park as a great alternative to Canadian Rivers' Day. Come out and:

- plant a tree
- support Save Our Seine
- enjoy a BBQ
- · meet new friends
- get involved
- learn about Métis culture



A Farewell to Dave J. Danyluk: SOS coordinator 2002-2007

The story begins in 2002 when I received a call from a University of Winnipeg student enquiring about Save Our Seine Environment Inc. He went on to explain that he was doing research on volunteer environmental groups and was particularly interested in learning everything he could about SOS. That student was **David Danyluk**. I'm sure at the time neither of us suspected what a profound influence he would have on SOS and in turn to the overall makeup of the Seine River Greenway.

In very short order, Dave became fully familiar with the internal workings of our group, first as a keen observer at SOS meetings and ultimately as a totally engaged board member. Around this time, Bev Sawchuk became president of SOS and was successful in securing funding for a full-time coordinator. David was available, was eminently qualified, but most importantly was willing to work for a few proverbial peanuts at a job that would subsume his being for the next six years.

He routinely made educational presentations to school groups. He shamelessly lobbied politicians and potential funding agencies. His duties included organizing greenings and cleanings and occasionally taking interested parties for a paddle down his favourite river.



As the first paid coordinator for SOS, David largely wrote his own job description, albeit with input from our president and the board. A typical day might include fielding complaints and enquires about everchallenging activities along the Seine river corridor.

Bev Sawchuk as president along with Dave as expert coordinator/facilitator morphed into a dynamic team that would forever change the direction of SOS. They were instrumental in raising the profile of SOS to such an extent that SOS became the proud recipient of four prestigious environmental awards in one year. In between the more prosaic, Dave still found time to organize and promote our own SOS 'Rivers Day'. This has become a yearly event, attracting numerous paddlers, walkers, and friends of SOS. It is a day of fun and enlightened awareness, giving meaning to our adopted motto: "A river lies waiting to be discovered".

Among the many projects, that Dave can take great pride in having promoted and propelled the following stand out as particularly significant.

1) Fund raising and lobbying government to save over 80 acres of pristine forest; now known as 'Bois des Esprits'.



2) Creation of the Seine River Greenway Map. This beautiful document portrays the heritage, flora, fauna, hydrology, and geography of the urban Seine. It has appropriately been referenced as "a work of art".



Unfortunately, funding for our creative coordinator has run out and Dave is now devoting his boundless energy to a new set of challenges with the Manitoba Housing Renewal Corporation. We wish you well in your new career Dave and we search for words that would convey our profound gratitude for all you have done to make our little piece of paradise ever more perfect.

3) A severely contaminated riverside property has been oozing tar-like chemicals into the Seine River for years. With persistent pressure from SOS the present owners; IKO and government are finally embarking on a multi-million dollar cleanup. St. Boniface Trail Interim Progress Report

The North St. Boniface Interpretive Trail, sometimes also referred to as "The Secret Forest" or "Seine River Parkway", is again showing its natural beauty. Although signage indicates that the trail is temporarily closed for a major facelift by the City of Winnipeg, many neighbours are frequently enjoying this natural jewel that abounds with waterfowl, turtles, birds and plenty of green space. The river is full with thousands of small fish fry, feeding on mosquito larva in the shallow areas of the river.

Young and old, families with children, athletes and cyclists are enjoying this natural oasis well hidden in the heart of St. Boniface.

Our Green Team has worked hard to sweep the trail clean after the spring flood and picking up garbage that the tourists leave behind. They have also helped a long-term wayward soul on the trail to keep his home on the banks of the Seine clean and safe. Mr. Sam T., as he his affectionately called by the local homeowners, had the misfortunate to be forced to make his home with a view on the banks of the Seine River. We spoke to him and he promised to keep his area clean and safe. He also said he will speak to his young friends who frequently come and visit him to do the same. Perhaps Sam will turn out to be our newest SOS volunteer on site??

The Green Team members, Sarah Reilly and Kirsti Simms, have also cut and moved a few large winddowned trees, trimmed back shrubs and vegetation to widen the trail to about 5 feet, making it comfortable for walking and hiking.

We also established a good rapport with various city departments. The staff of the departments of Parks and Open Spaces as well as Naturalist Services and Planning and Land Use have met with us on the trail and advised us on possible plantings along the trail and safety issues. The Public Works Department, under Lead Foreman, Jack Sinclair, has already had his staff mow the large green area behind the Seine River Café to make it safer and more appealing.

We would like to especially thank Ken McKim from the Planning, Property and Development Department, Jönina Ewart, Superintendent of Parks and Open Spaces and Cheryl Heming, City Naturalist and their staff for their expert advise.

A major facelift of the trail is planned for this construction season by the City's Planning and Development Department connecting our trail to the historic home of the Franco-Manitoban author Gabriele Roy on Deschambault Street. At this point the Seine River Trail will officially become a functional part of the TransCanada Trail system in St. Boniface.

Are You Encroaching on City Land?

What is Encroachment?: Encroachment is any type of vegetation, man-made object or item of personal property of a person which exits or extends wholly or partially upon public lands. This includes any aerial, surface, or subsurface encroachments either deliberately or inadvertently.

The Bylaw: It is an infraction of section 12 of City of Winnipeg bylaw 3219/82 which states that no person shall "disturb, remove, damage, or destroy any rock, gravel, sand or soil" or "disturb, damage, trim, or pick vegetation" on Parks Land. This includes mowing, storing personal belongings on, planting vegetation on, or landscaping any City-owned land without prior authorization

Some examples of illegal encroachments:

- Play structures such as swings, slides, tree houses, etc.
- Stairs, decks, lighting, irrigation or sprinkler systems, gardens, etc.
- Paved or unpaved pathways.
- Unauthorized mowing, cutting, pruning, watering, or burning.
- Unauthorized application of pesticides or herbicides.
- Dumping of household waste.
- Dumping or storage of garden waste, or leaves as they are a fire hazard.- Vehicles parked on City land for storage or retail sale.
 - Sheds, trailers, campers, boats, or building materials.
